Graduation Application Information for Students Who Plan to Graduate in May 2004

Graduation applications for students who want to graduate in May 2004 are due in the Registrar's Office by Sept. 12. Applications and degree worksheets are available on the Truman Web page at <http://registrar.truman.edu>.

If you have already applied for graduation and are enrolled in courses other than those originally listed on your graduation application, you need to update your graduation application with the Registrar's Office. To update your application, go to the Registrar's Office in McClain Hall 104 anytime between 8 a.m.-5 p.m., Monday-Friday.

If you have already applied for graduation and are interested in using the 2003-2005 General Catalog to fulfill degree requirements, you should make arrangements to meet with your adviser as soon as possible to discuss this option. If you then decide to move up to the new catalog, you must submit a completed 2003-2005 degree worksheet, which is available at <http://registrar.truman.edu>, to the Registrar's Office by Sept. 12. You do not need to submit a new degree application. The Registrar's Office will then review your new degree plan and alert you to any problems. If you move up to the 2003-2005 catalog, you will be required to meet all major, minor and degree requirements as listed in that catalog.
