Power Outage Scheduled for Baldwin Hall and McClain Hall

The electricity will be temporarily turned off to Baldwin and McClain Halls while feeder cables are re-located, due to the Magruder Hall project.

This work is currently scheduled to begin at 5:30 p.m. on Friday, July 9; service should be restored by early evening on Saturday, July 10. If unanticipated problems are encountered, the outage could continue into Sunday.

This unavoidable power outage will affect access to all computing services that are located in McClain Hall, including all Web pages, network drives, Banner, Blackboard, and dial-up service. Internet access for the following campus locations will be unavailable: Baldwin Hall, Centennial Hall, Child Development Center, Kirk Building, Kirk Memorial, Magruder Hall, McClain Hall, Ophelia Parrish, Pickler Memorial Library, Public Safety, the Student Recreation Center, and the Student Union Building.

While Truman Web pages will be unavailable, Web traffic will be redirected to a page that will say we are down due to a planned power outage. ITS is also taking steps to ensure that the e-mail server remains active and that no messages are lost.

Faculty Sabbaticals Reinstated

Vice President for Academic Affairs Garry Gordon announced July 1 that faculty sabbaticals will be reinstated for the 2005-2006 academic year.

"President Dixon indicated in her installation address that she had placed the reinstatement of sabbaticals among her priorities, and we were able to develop a plan to accomplish this using existing funds," Gordon said.

Faculty members who wish to apply for a sabbatical leave for the 2005-2006 academic year should submit a completed application to their division head by Sept. 20, 2004. Application guidelines can be viewed at http://vpaa.truman.edu/ sabbaticals/.

For subsequent years, an earlier application deadline will be established, and faculty will be asked to submit a letter of intent to their division head five months in advance of their formal sabbatical application. This added step in the application process will provide a greater opportunity to coordinate and plan within divisions and disciplines. More specific details about the application process and timelines for 2006-2007 academic year sabbaticals will be shared during the fall semester.
