

Truman Recognized Again as No. 1 Public University in the Midwest Region-Master's Category

For the eighth year in a row, Truman State University has been recognized as the No. 1 Public University in the Midwest Region-Master's Category by U.S. News & World Report's "America's Best Colleges 2005." Truman also was ranked No. 9 overall in the Midwest region among both private and public institutions. Truman is the only public university in Missouri to be included in the top 10 public university-master's ranking. The Midwest region category includes Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

U.S. News & World Report based its regional master's rankings on graduation and retention rates, faculty resources, student selectivity, financial resources, alumni giving, peer assessments among those institutions whose focus is mainly undergraduate and master's-level programs.

ITS Announces Updated Portal - TruView

The campus portal (formerly Campus L Pipeline) has taken on a whole new look, with greater reliability and new features. This new product, named TruView, is now available for currently enrolled Truman students and will soon be available for faculty and staff. The site provides students with Web-based e-mail, a personal calendar, a customizable portal with many news and entertainment sources to choose from, as well as campus news and announcements. TruView also provides single login and one-click access to register for classes, pay your bills online, view your schedule, view your grades and transcripts and lots more useful information. This new portal has been purchased and implemented in response to student, faculty and staff feedback regarding Campus Pipeline and Banner Web Services and provides a single login

and more seamless access to Banner Web Services.

TruView is accessible by directing your Internet browser to http://truview.truman.edu. Students can log on using their user name and their network password. The network password is initially set to the student's social security number and can be changed by either logging onto a Windows computer on the Truman network or by going to https://secure.truman. edu/password. Students must change their password before they can log onto TruView.

Louise received a Bachelor of Arts in Music, and played the piano and cello. She was active in many extracurricular activities on campus and was a member of the string quartet. She had a love for all kinds of music and taught piano lessons for many years, instilling a lifelong appreciation of music in many of her students. She passed away in January 2003, and R.L. established this scholarship in fond memory of her, with the hope that it will help someone with the same love for music.

The scholarship will be awarded to a music major with preference given to a descendant of alumni and with preference to a Missouri resident.

R.L. resides in Bevier, Mo., and in Texas for part of the year.

Truman Has Largest Freshman Class in Seven Years for the 2004-2005 Academic Year

Truman began its annual Truman Week with its largest freshman class in seven years. Although the final enrollment numbers will not be known for several days, preliminary figures indicate that Truman will enroll approximately 1,500 freshmen, an increase of 14 percent over last year.

The 2004 entering freshman class is also one of Truman's strongest academically with an average ACT score of 27.3 and an average high school GPA of 3.76. Seventy-seventy percent scored 25 or higher on the exam with 37 percent scoring in the 95th percentile or higher. In addition, more than 70 percent of the freshmen were in the top 20 percent of their high school graduating classes, and 99 percent had some form of leadership experience. Eighty-two percent of the class had a 3.5 or higher high school grade point average.

City Offers Transit Service

If you do not have a car, Kirk-Tran may be the answer. Kirk-Tran is the public transit service administered by the City of Kirksville.

Kirk-Tran operates weekdays from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m., Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sundays from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Kirk-Tran costs \$1 per stop inside the Kirksville city limits and is available seven days a week. Kirk-Tran also is available Monday through Friday inside Adair County within a 15-mile radius of downtown Kirksville for \$2 each way.

The Kirk-Tran system operates on an advanced reservation system. Reservations

may be made by calling 665.8404 in Kirksville, and toll-free 1.877.666.KIRK (5475) outside of Kirksville, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until noon and from 1 p.m. until 3 p.m.

Kirk-Tran is a cooperative effort between the City of Kirksville, the Region II Planning and Coordinating Council for Developmental Disabilities, the Kirksville Regional Center and OATS Inc. and is funded by the City of Kirksville, Kirksville Regional Center, MoDOT, and a grant from the Missouri Planning Council for Developmental Disabilities.
