Kohlenberg Lyceum Series Begins with Harlem Blues and Jazz Band

The 2004-2005 Kohlenberg Lyceum Series will kick off the season with a performance by the Harlem Blues and Jazz Band at 7:30 p.m., Sept. 21, in Baldwin Auditorium.

This band was formed in 1973, and a veritable Who's Who of jazz musicians have been a part of this group. The current members are Joey Morant, trumpet and vocals; Fred Staton, tenor saxophone; Lloyd Mayers, piano; Art Baron, trombone, composer

and arranger; Michael Max Fleming, bass; Shelton Gary, drums; Ruth Brisbane, vocals; and Bill Wurtzel, electric guitar.

Morant electrifies audiences with his dazzling horn techniques, skillful scat singing and humorous asides. Staton is one of the senior members of the band. He has performed with Billy Eckstine, Howard "Sticks" McGhee, Art Blackey and Errol Garner. Mayers was the pianist to Sammy Davis Jr. for 11 years. He also took over the piano chair in the Duke Ellington Orchestra following Ellington's death. Fleming has performed with Mary Lou Williams, Sammy Davis Jr., Jimmy Witherspoon, Clifford Jordan, Chet Baker and Billy Eckstine. Gary studied drums with the great Jo Jones of
