Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar to Come to Campus Sept. 29-Oct. 1

Andrea Liu, professor of physics at the University of Pennsylvania, will visit Truman State University from Sept. 29-Oct. 1, as a Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar. During her stay, she will visit classes and meet with faculty and students.

University of Pennsylvania's Department of Physics and Astronomy said, "Liu is a theorist who studies charged polymers, electrostatics and the mechanics of 'jamming', a term she coined to describe the breakdown of flow in sand, glasses and foams."

Liu and her husband have recently joined the University of Pennsylvania faculty. They previously served on the faculty of the University of California at Los Angeles.

Liu will conduct a Physics Colloquium on Jamming for Truman students and fac-

ulty at 3 p.m., Sept. 30. The public is invited to attend her lecture on "The Physics of How Cells Crawl and Listeria Spreads", which will be given at 8 p.m., Sept. 30, in Violette Hall 1000. The lecture will discuss the unusual physics involved in these biological events.

As a Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar, Liu will visit several campuses this year at the invitation of their Phi Beta Kappa chapters. Truman is one of four campuses in Missouri that hosts chapters of this prestigious honor society for the liberal arts and sciences. Truman is only the second public Missouri university to be so honored.

Walker and Doris Allen Fellowship for Faculty Excellence Nominations Sought

The Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs is now accepting nominations for the Walker and Doris Allen Fellowship for Faculty Excellence.

The Allens established the Fellowship with one of the largest outright gifts ever made to the Truman State University Foundation. The \$10,000 Walker and Doris Allen Fellowships recognize outstanding faculty members who have made exemplary contributions to the success of the University and its students. Up to three faculty members are selected each year.

The Fellowships are open to all tenured or tenure-track faculty who have completed at least four years of full-time service at Truman. Faculty may be nominated for the Fellowship by Truman faculty colleagues, academic divisions or disciplines.

The Missouri Government Internship Program offers a unique opportunity for students to intern at the Capitol in Jefferson City, Mo., with a public official, legislator or state agency during the spring 2005 semester. The internship, which is open to all majors, provides an inside look at state government.

"I would recommend this internship to everyone," former intern Kenton Moorhead said. "It provides the perfect opportunity to see first-hand how laws are made and become an informed citizen." The interns live in Jefferson City and receive a stipend of \$2,200. Interns may earn up to 15 hours of credit.
