Educator of the Year Search Narrows

Truman's Educator of the Year committee has announced six semifinalists from the field of nominated professors.

The decision for finalists was based on the nomination form submitted, the professors' essay response and the classroom surveys of the professors' students.

The finalists include: John Ishiyama, professor of political science; Jeanne Mitchell, associate professor of biology; Maria Nagan, assistant professor of chemistry; Eric Patterson, associate professor of chemistry; Priscilla Riggle, associate professor of English; and Lynn Rose, associate professor of history.

Between April 15-22, the committee will sit in on lectures in the finalists' classes. They will choose the winner at the conclusion of the interviews.

The new Educator of the Year will be announced at a banquet at 6 p.m., May 3, in the Student Union Building Georgian Room. Students, faculty and staff can now purchase tickets until April 28, in the Student Senate Office. Tickets are \$10 for faculty and staff and \$7.50 for students. Students who have a meal plan can use one meal toward the purchase and pay \$4.50.

Members of Student Senate, Phi Kappa Phi and the Pershing Society comprise the Educator of the Year Committee.

Truman Listed as one of "America's Best Value Colleges"

Truman State University is being recognized as one of the nation's best values by *The Princeton Review* "America's Best Value Colleges" 2006 edition.

To produce the ranking, the New York-based education services company examined academic rating, financial aid rating, tuition GPA (or the real cost of college) and student borrowing of each school. Specifically, they looked at how each school stacked up against all the others in those four areas and the data they collected

from the administrators at more than 350 colleges, and surveys of students attending them.

"Bottom line: the 81 schools that met our criteria for this book are all great college education deals," said Robert Franek, vice president of publishing for *The Princeton Review*.

In addition, *The Princeton Review* lists Truman in the category Best in the Midwest.

Free Enterprise Team Takes First in Missouri Contest

Truman's Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) organization was named a SIFE USA Regional Champion at the overall competition in St. Louis, April 7.

The team won numerous distinctions after presenting a report of their yearlong community outreach projects to a panel of business leaders.

Among the awards, they were named a finalist in the SIFE USA National Free Market Economics Competition sponsored by Aflac; a finalist in the SIFE Entrepreneurship Competition sponsored by Sam's Club, a finalist in the HSBC Education Trust and the Corporate,

Investment Banking and Markets Division of HSBC; and a finalist in the SIFE USA National Personal Financial Success Skills Competition.

The team now will advance to the national level of SIFE competition at the SIFE USA National Exposition May 22-24, in Kansas City, Mo.

SIFE is an international, professional and service organization that allows members to develop leadership, teamwork and communication skills through learning, practicing and teaching the practices of free enterprise.

Truman, Kirksville Community Benefit from Recycling Center

More than a year ago Truman State University held a ribbon cutting for a new glass recycling machine that would provide area residents the option of recycling their glass.

"The success of the program was contingent upon the citizens willingness to bring their rinsed glass to Truman's Recycling Center and they did," Howard Worcester, Truman recycling coordinator, said.

The first two months of operation the Center averaged approximately 100 pounds of glass a day. Today, the Center averages more than 400-500 pounds a day.

The machine grinds glass to a coarse sand, which can then be used as drainage fill, pothole filler, sidewalk construction and numerous artistic projects. Truman has already used more than 30 tons on campus in various cement and pipe fill projects. The recycled glass will continue to be used in various construction projects.

Recycled glass was used in the morning Rotary Club project for a new walking trail near the community center on the Kirksville

Senior Living Campus in September 2004. The recycled glass serves as the sand base of a four-foot wide concrete sidewalk.

The machine was purchased with grant money from the State of Missouri Region C Solid Waste Management District.

For campus residents, there are drop-off bins located throughout all buildings. They are located in major traffic zones and are available at all hours buildings are open.

Off-Campus

For people living off-campus, there are recycling bins at the recycling center. It's located at the Building #4 Dulaney on the south end of campus, across from the rappelling tower. Items can be dropped off 24 hours a day, although the Center is only open 8 a.m.-3 p.m. on weekdays. In addition, the trash company picks up recycling set on the curb on designated days in the community.

Can be placed in book recycle containers or placed with papers.

Any paper that can be placed in mixed office.*

♻️ PRINTER CARTRIDGES

Can be tied with a string, put in paper bags, placed in a cardboard box or placed loose in newsprint containers.

NOTE: Advertising supplements that come in the newspapers can stay with the newspapers when recycled.

♻️ MAGAZINES

Only slick or shiny magazines and catalogs accepted.

Time, Newsweek, National Geographic, Catalogs, Etc.

♻️ CANS

All aluminum cans are acceptable. Please rinse the cans and remove labels if possible.

♻️ GLASS

Glass must be rinsed. Lids are not accepted.

♻️ MIXED OFFICE PAPER

Check the bottom of the container for the recycling logo. Inside the logo is a number identifying the type of plastic. Generally, plastics accepted for recycling at Truman are #1 and #2 only.

Containers must be rinsed. Caps and lids may be left on.

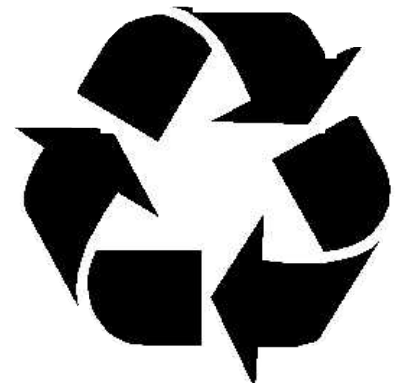
