Truman Chemistry Department Ranks in Top 25 Nationally for Preparedness

Truman State University is ranked 13th in the nation for the preparation of American Chemical Society-certified Bachelor of Science graduates in chemistry for the 2000-2001 academic year.

This achievement was announced in the Aug. 25 edition of the weekly chemistry newsmagazine, "Chemical and Engineering News."

The "Top 25" section reveals that the Truman Chemistry department ranks above institutions such as Pennsylvania State University, U.S. Air Force Academy, U.S. Naval Academy, Harvard University, and Texas A&M University.

"The chemistry faculty takes great pride that all of its B.S. graduates since 1986-1987 have received American Chemical Society certified degrees." Roger Festa, professor of chemistry, said. "This notation on a resume

is a powerful credential for admission to graduate study in chemistry or to professional school, and for obtaining a position in the American chemical process industry."

The accreditation is renewed every five years following an internal self-study and an external review of our program.

The "Top 25" was figured using statistics based on the number of graduating American Chemical Society-certified chemists. Biochemistry majors are not included under this heading.

This is not the first time Truman has been ranked among the "Top 25" undergraduate chemistry programs nationally. This is, however, the highest showing on the list since Truman's chemistry program was accredited by the American Chemical Society (ACS), beginning with the 1986-1987 academic year.

Truman Ranks Fourth in Nation in CPA Exam

In a recently released report by the National Association of State Boards of Accountancy, Truman's Master of Accountancy students ranked fourth in the nation and first in Missouri for passing all four parts of the May 2002 Certified Public Accountant exam on the first attempt.

Seventy percent of the Truman students passed all four parts on the first attempt, compared to the national average of 31 percent. Truman's Master of Accountancy students also ranked third in the nation in auditing, sixth in the nation in accounting and reporting-other areas, eighth in the nation in financial accounting & reporting-business enterprises, and 16th in the nation in business law and professional responsibilities. Truman's ranking placed the University between the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the University of Georgia.

Truman State University Master of Accountancy students earned the gold, silver and bronze medals for the three highest scores in the State of Missouri on the May 2002 Uniform CPA Examination, and they claimed six of the top 10 scores in the state.

"We have a long tradition of being number one on the CPA exam in the State of Missouri," James Bailey, head of the division of business and accountancy, said. "When our students consistently outperform students from schools such as Washington University, St. Louis University and the University of Missouri-Columbia, employers pay attention."

Truman is one of only 163 business schools in the world accredited in both business and accounting by The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB International), the premier accrediting agency for business schools.

The Missouri Government Internship Program offers a unique opportunity for students to intern at the Capitol in Jefferson City, Mo., with a public official, legislator or state agency during the spring 2004 semester. The internship, which is open to all majors, provides an inside look at state government.

Interns are assigned to public officials or offices based upon compatibility and interests. Care is taken to consider each student's major, political orientation, career goals and other preferences. The goal is to enhance the probability that each placement becomes a successful learning experience.

The interns live in Jefferson City during the

spring semester and receive a stipend of \$2,200. Interns may earn up to 15 hours of credit.
