Numerous Volunteer Opportunities Available Through the SERVE Center

If you are interested in volunteering on campus or in the Kirksville community, the SERVE Center is ready to help hook you up with a volunteer project.

The SERVE Center, located on the main floor of the Student Union Building, assists and promotes student involvement in community service.

The SERVE Center provides information about organizations that are looking for volunteers. It also assists volunteers in contacting someone involved in a particular project. Students can fill out an information sheet at the SERVE Center that allows the Center to notify a volunteer of an opportunity that appeals to their interests.

A Truman Week volunteer opportunity will be at the Adair County Family YMCA for their 40th anniversary celebration. Volunteers are needed Aug. 28 throughout

the day from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. for two hour shifts.

Other volunteer opportunities include adopting a grandparent and helping with an after-school program. Twin Pines Adult Care Center needs volunteers to adopt a grandparent and the Family Advocacy Center needs volunteers for the after-school program.

During the school year there will be additional opportunities including the Bowl-for-Gold in November and the Big Event in the spring. The Big Event is a way for Truman students to thank the Kirksville community through service activities such as raking leaves, washing windows, painting, and much more.

Information Technology Services Announces Updated Portal - TruView

TruView is now available for incoming Truman students and will be available soon for returning students, faculty and staff. The site provides students with Web-based e-mail, a personal calendar, a customizable portal with many news and entertainment sources to choose from, as well as campus news and announcements. TruView also provide one-click access to register for classes, pay your bills online, view your schedule, view your grades and transcripts and lots more useful information.

Students can log onto TruView using their user name and their network password. The network password is initially set

to the student's social security number and can be changed by either logging onto a Windows computer on the Truman network or by going to <https://secure.truman.edu/password>. Students must change their initial password before logging onto TruView. TruView is accessible from any Internet-connected computer by going to <http://truview.truman.edu>.

Plan Ahead for Internship Opportunities

Tremendous opportunities are available to students through internships sponsored by Truman State University. Truman sponsors three internships: The Missouri Government Internship Program, The Washington Center Internships in Washington, D.C., and Harry S. Truman Library and Museum Internships.

The Missouri Government Internship Program offers a unique opportunity for juniors or seniors to intern at the Capitol in Jefferson City, Mo., with a public official or legislator during the spring semester. The internship, which is open to all majors, provides an inside look at state government.

The interns live in Jefferson City during the spring semester and receive a stipend of \$2,200. Interns may earn up to 15 hours of credit.

Truman students interested in spending a spring semester in Washington, D.C., are given that opportunity through the Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars (TWC). The annual program awards up to five Truman participants 15 credit hours for their internship work and an independent study project. All students with a 3.25 GPA or higher can apply.

The Harry S. Truman Presidential Museum and Library Internship provides an opportunity for a student to spend a semester at the Truman Library, located in Independence, Mo.

The internship is open to all Truman juniors and seniors who meet University requirements for an internship. Students can earn up to 10 hours of credit for this full-time internship and they receive a stipend. After being selected by a University committee and the Truman Library staff, the interns may work in a variety of areas of the library including archives, public relations, marketing, educational programming, museum development or visitor services. Assignments are based on the interns' abilities and interests along with the library's needs.

When thinking about an internship it is important to plan ahead for living arrangements. The University allows students who are accepted into a University-sponsored internship to be relieved of their residence hall contract without being charged a termination fee.

City Offers Transit Service

If you do not have a car, Kirk-Tran may be the answer. Kirk-Tran is the public transit service administered by the City of Kirksville.

Kirk-Tran operates weekdays from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m., Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sundays from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Kirk-Tran costs \$1 per stop inside the Kirksville city limits and is available seven days a week. Kirk-Tran also is available Monday through Friday inside Adair County within a 15-mile radius of downtown Kirksville for \$2 each way.

The Kirk-Tran system operates on an advanced reservation system. Reservations may

be made by calling 665.8404 in Kirksville, and toll-free 1.877.666.KIRK (5475) outside of Kirksville, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until noon and from 1 p.m. until 3 p.m.

Kirk-Tran is a cooperative effort between the City of Kirksville, the Region II Planning and Coordinating Council for Developmental Disabilities, the Kirksville Regional Center and OATS Inc. and is funded by the City of Kirksville, Kirksville Regional Center, MoDOT, and a grant from the Missouri Planning Council for Developmental Disabilities.

Center Recycles Materials to Reduce Waste

Wondering what to do with your empty aluminum cans and used paper? Recycle them.

Recycle bins are available to the University community in all buildings on campus. These bins help the Recycling Center with its goal to reduce solid waste quantities as much as possible. In addition, the Recycling Center has a drop-off pad which allows members of the community to drop off recyclables when the Recycling Center is closed.

The University began its recycling program in October 2001 and purchased a cardboard baler to use in its center. The University recycles

1,000 pounds of cardboard each day with the baler. Cardboard material bins are located outside of most buildings.

Truman's Recycling Center is located in Building No. 4 in the Dulaney/Baldwin Complex at the south end of campus.

Students can volunteer to assist the Recycling Center at the center or in the residence halls.

WHAT TRUMAN RECYCLES:

♻️ CARDBOARD

Corrugated cardboard only. Please flatten and stack cardboard. Drop-off sites are available by most dumpsters on campus.

Not acceptable

*Wax coated cardboard
Feed/Seed sacks
Pop/Soda carriers
Anything with food scraps*

♻️ HARD BOOKS

Can be placed in book recycle containers or placed with papers.

Acceptable

*All books
Spiral binders
Books with glued ends*

♻️ CANS

All aluminum cans are acceptable. Please rinse the cans and remove labels if possible.

♻️ GLASS

Glass must be rinsed. Please discard all caps and lids.

♻️ NEWSPAPERS

Can be tied with a string, put in paper bags, placed in a cardboard box or placed loose in newsprint containers.

NOTE: Advertising supplements that come in the newspapers can stay with the newspapers when recycled.

♻️ MAGAZINES

Only slick or shiny magazines and catalogs accepted.

Examples

*Time, Newsweek,
National Geographic,
Catalogs, Etc.*

♻️ SHREDDED PAPER

All shredded paper must be in bags and tied securely.

Acceptable

*White paper
Colored paper
Any paper that can be placed in mixed office.*

♻️ PRINTER CARTRIDGES

♻️ MIXED OFFICE PAPER

Can be tied with string, placed in cardboard box or paper bags or placed loose in mixed office paper containers.

Acceptable

*Computer paper
Typing paper
Writing paper
Photocopy paper
Envelopes
Light pastel colors
File folders
Unwanted residential mail
Staples*

Not Acceptable

*Carbon paper, other sensitized paper
Blueprint paper
Film, photographs, tape or glue
Metal objects, spiral binders, fasteners*

♻️ PLASTIC BOTTLES AND JUGS

Check the bottom of the container for the recycling logo. Inside the logo is a number identifying the type of plastic. Generally, plastics accepted for recycling at Truman are #1 and #2 only. **Containers must be rinsed.**

Please discard all caps and lids.

Acceptable

*Milk jugs
Juice jugs
Food containers
Detergent bottles
Shampoo bottles
Butter containers
Bleach jugs
Yogurt containers
PET containers*

Not Acceptable

Motor oil bottles

SIMPLE THINGS YOU CAN DO

- Use both sides of your paper. (Recycle paper after use.)
- Encourage your students to use both sides of their paper - both for drafts and papers they turn in.
- Recycle your newspapers, magazines, hard books, soda cans and plastic bottles.
- Use e-mail for notices.
- Write to remove your name from "junk" mail lists. Go to <http://www.newdream.org/junkmail/>.
