Truman Seeks Comments From the Public About the University

Truman State University is seeking comments from the public about the University in preparation for its periodic evaluation by its regional accrediting agency. The University will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit Jan. 31-Feb. 2, 2005, by a team representing the Higher Learning Commission, a Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Truman State University has been accredited by the Commission since 1914. The team will review the institution's ongoing ability to meet the Commission's Criteria for Accreditation.

The public is invited to submit comments regarding the University.

Comments must address substantive matters related to the quality of the institution or its academic programs. Comments

must be in writing and signed; comments cannot be treated as confidential. Please note individuals with a specific dispute or grievance with an institution should request the separate "Policy on Complaints" document from the Commission Office. The Commission cannot settle disputes between institutions and individuals whether those are faculty, staff, students or others, complaints will be not considered third party comments.

Sylvia Macauley, assistant professor of history, and Alanna Preussner, associate professor of English, were recently presented the William O'Donnell Lee Advising Award.

Dr. Jeanne Stephens Lee Blackmar established the Lee Advising Award in honor of her late husband who was a member and chair of the University's Board of Regents during the 1970s. The award pays tribute to excellent advisers, encourages professional
