Foundation Announces New Scholarship

The Truman State University Foundation is pleased to announce the Jack Klein Health and Exercise Science Scholarship. This scholarship will provide \$1,000 a year, for the next four years, to deserving Truman students.

The Jack Klein Health and Exercise Science Scholarship will be awarded to assist a student wishing to teach health, exercise science, anatomy or physiology. The scholarship is funded by Jack Klein. Klein graduated from Truman with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1967 and a master's degree in 1970. He taught physi-

cal education and coached at the Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School for 23 years, and at the Alabama School for the Blind the past 11 years. He resides in Talladega, Ala.

The scholarship will be awarded to a student who meets the following criteria: Health and exercise science major, student who is planning to teach, GPA high enough to obtain a teaching certificate, non-athlete, and preference will be given to a student who is planning to teach adaptive/special education.

First TruTech Challenge "Call for Papers"

Truman's TLTR (Teaching/Learning Technology Roundtable) is proud to announce the first TruTech Challenge, a juried competition of projects that use technology to achieve some learning outcome. This will be an annual event. Students, faculty, staff and student organizations are invited to submit projects to the Challenge. Submitters will be asked to present their projects at Truman's Technology Fair during the University Conference, Feb. 16, 2005. The best project in the "faculty/staff" category and the best project in the "individual student, student group or class" category will each receive a tech prize. The prizes are graciously being donated to Truman by Dell, Inc. Details about the prizes will be announced in the future.

To be a part of the TruTech Challenge, you should submit a 250-1,000 word description of the project. The description should include a statement of the project's purpose (what learning outcome it attempts to achieve), the ways in which the project uses technology, the ways in which the achievement of the project's purpose is facilitated by the use of technology, the

progress that has been made in executing the project and what assistance, if any, was received from others in executing the project. Also, you should submit any supporting materials for the project that you would like the TruTech Challenge jury to consider. These materials might include links to Web sites, printed or electronic documents, CD-ROMs, videotapes/DVDs, audio recordings or artwork.

Project submissions should be made by Jan. 26, 2005, to Chad Mohler, either via e-mail at chmohler@truman.edu or campus mail to Division of Social Science, McClain Hall 214.

By submitting a project, you agree to allow its description to be posted on TLTR's Web site at <http://tltr.truman.edu>, present your project at the Technology Fair on Feb. 16, and have your project showcased in greater depth on the TLTR Web site if you are a winner of the contest.

The TLTR committee will judge each of the submitted projects on the degree to which its use of technology enhances the project's attempt at achieving its learning outcome. Prize winners will be announced at the Technology Fair.
